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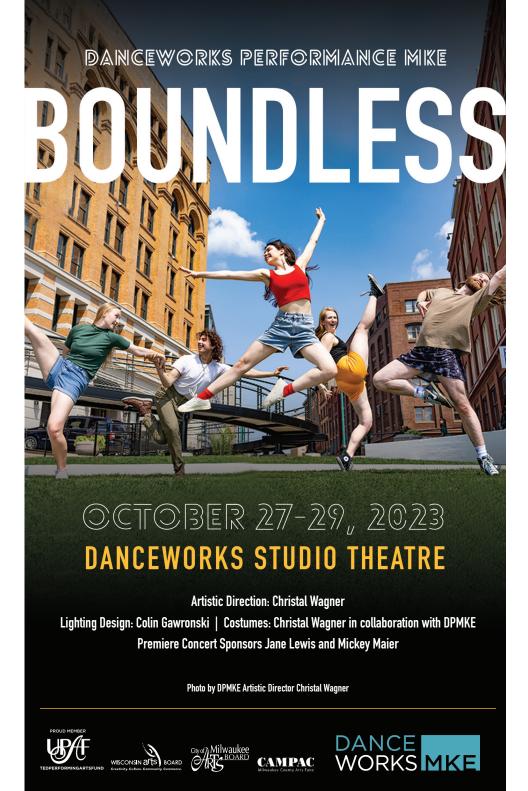

A NOTE FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR:

What is Jazz dance anyway, and where does it come from? If you yourself aren't sure of the answer, then I am glad you are here. I am lucky enough to have been brought up with a large variety of dance in

my youth. Tap dance was first including kickline and can can. Then my parents and I joined a west coast swing dance club in the late 90's and also practiced east coast swing, two step, and hustle. From there I was lucky enough to study ballroom dance including jive, samba, paso-doble, rumba, cha cha cha and salsa. In college I would go on to practice Lindy Hop regularly with a natural affinity for its rhythm and rootedness. This training easily translated to Jazz dance. My education in rhythmic stepping patterns was vast and wide.

In my time learning these culturally diverse styles, no one mentioned the history of these dances. Very few mentioned that jazz dance is delineated right from the swing era and from vernacular stepping patterns such as the Charleston, the Shorty George, the Susie Q, the Big Apple, the Tranky Doo, and the Shim Sham. These steps were passed socially from dancer to dancer on ballroom floors in 20's, 30's and 40's. I was taught the steps but I was not taught that these steps emerged from African dance practices brought to the United States by enslaved peoples who were ripped from their culture, banned from drumming, and dance was their only way to express and communicate with each other across tribes and plantations. The truth is that for our unique American history, the forms of dance that are highly valued, funded or highlighted are ones of eurocentric origin or eurocentric adaptation led by white choreographers who stole, borrowed, popularized and neglected to cite where they got their rooted style from.

Today the community of dance that regularly acknowledges the origins of its form is Lindy Hop. I'd like to take a page out of their book by shifting the narrative not only by bringing Jazz to the forefront but stating where it comes from, how it started and how to continue to celebrate it. I hope this concert is the first of many and my energy spent creating dances, highlighting creators and teaching in the form feels boundless. I will do whatever it takes to continue to educate dancers, audiences, and supporters, giving credit where credit is overdue.
